Location and Travel

The Justice & Police Museum is located next to Circular Quay on the corner of Albert and Phillip Streets (see map below).

Please meet Sydney Living Museum (SLM) staff outside the iron gates in front of the courthouse on Phillip Street (see photo below).

Parking

There is no bus parking at the Justice & Police Museum, however buses may stop to allow students to disembark on Macquarie Street. There are bus parking zones on Macquarie Street which require drivers to remain with their vehicles.

Public transport

The Justice & Police Museum is a two minute walk from Circular Quay and Circular Quay train station. Important information

You are required to arrive 10 minutes prior to your scheduled starting time to allow time for cloakroom and toilet visits for the students. Late arrival will result in the program being shortened to compensate. If you are running late please contact us on 02 9251 5988.

Visits for schools are by pre-booked, guided tours only. If it is necessary to split large groups, self-guided visits of the property are not available while one group is participating in a booked program. In these circumstances, it is the responsibility of teachers to organise alternative activities for their groups at a different location.

To ensure the conservation of the building, we do not permit food or drink in the Museum.

This challenging and thought-provoking program develops students' skills in historical research and critical thinking, and an appreciation of history as a study of human experience.

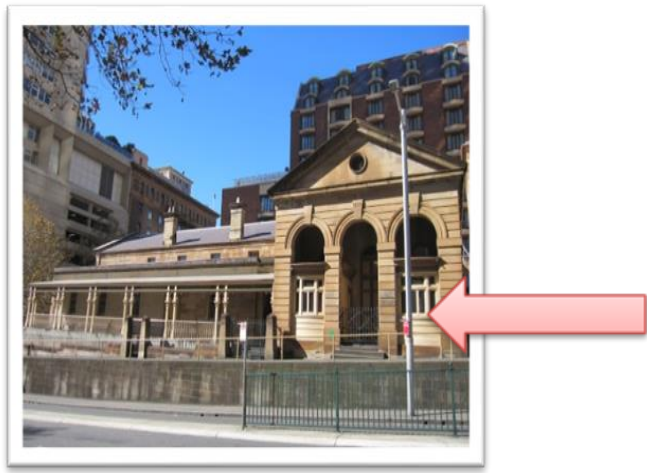

3. Bailed Up!

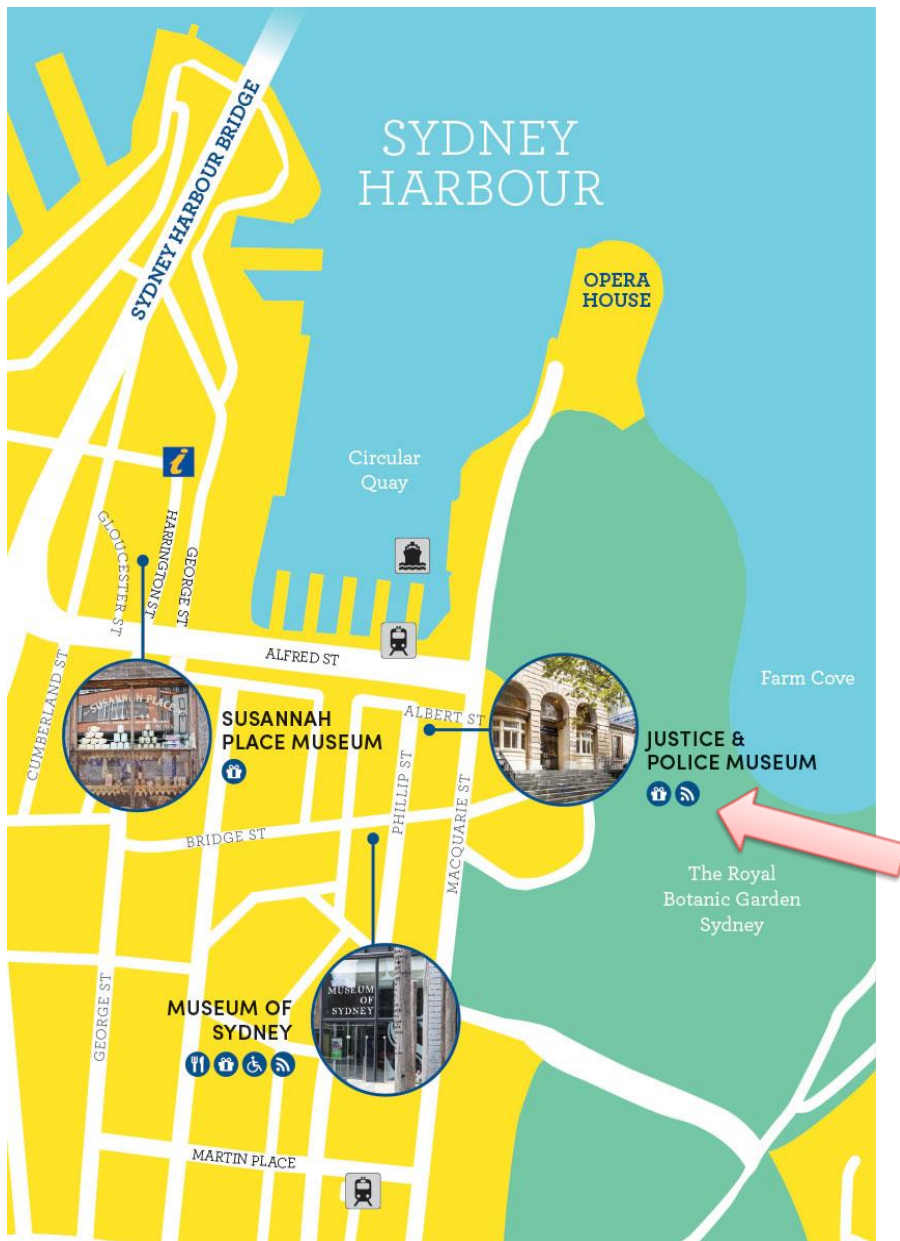
Stage 3 – Creative Arts, Visual Arts, HSIE
